Jefferson

We visited the flourishing commercial town of Jefferson in the early part of the week. In a business point of view, if it has an equal with no greater population, we have never seen it. Although the bulk of the cotton has been shipped up, freights employ several steamers two or three of which were at the wharf at the time of our visit. Several large brick buildings are gong up. The water is comparatively low—indeed below that the smallest boats could not have reached there two years ago, and now the largest class boats that ever ascended that high, are plying regularly. This seems strange, but it is nevertheless true. As a place of commerce, Iefferson is a fixed fact.
